Message from our Principal - Dress Code

Questions have arisen recently around the Dress Code and how it is enforced.

The Dress Code is under-pinned by a handful of educational, social and economic assumptions. Sometimes it is helpful to be explicit about these things.

First things first: clothing needs to be conducive to school work, which includes lots of movement; it also it needs to be comfortable and season-appropriate.

Then it starts to get complicated.



We all use clothes and personal adornment to signal all sorts of things: status, mood, intention, social preference. We also use them to project something of our personality and to mark our place in the world. The desire to do this at school increases as the children get older. Some are blissfully unaware of what they are wearing until puberty sets in. Others have their awareness heightened by peer pressure, older siblings, or their own interest in aesthetics and decoration.

We allow a discreet use of jewellery and make-up from class eight onwards. It is a balancing act between respecting the students' developmental phase on the one hand and reining in excess on the other.

We draw the line at unnatural hair colouring, facial piercings, or clothes that expose too much of the body. We share with the older students the impact their choices may have on younger children, reminding them that they may be role models without even knowing it. We also acknowledge the pit-falls of premature sexualisation and the dangers of awakening body-image issues in young children.

We also monitor logos and images. The not-so-subtle subtle impact of French Connection UK's advertising campaign a few years ago was an extreme example of how words and images float in front of us all the time and affect us unconsciously. Whilst branded clothes may be comfortable and discreet, they can also be a way of reinforcing status, an unspoken 'I can afford this kind of top, you can't'. We also object to the use of the human being as an advertising hoarding. I am not aware that GAP and Jack Wills pay for the space they rent on our children's torsos. This is another interesting one to discuss with the students as they get older.

When students contravene the dress code we send reminders home and tell students to cover-up sometimes to turn clothing inside out. They very rarely object and usually take a `it's a fair cop` attitude. We also try to avoid embarrassing the student. They may not have an alternative to the top they are wearing or the torn jeans.

With hair dye the rule is `get it sorted quickly or cover up`. This is not always easy, and the guilty party soon discovers the dubious delights of repeated rinsing.

The key phrase in all of this is `we draw a line...` It has to be drawn somewhere, with as much sensitivity and consciousness as possible. We also draw a line under the amount of time and energy we are willing to invest in debate and discussion around what students wear. Alan Swindell, Principal

Year 7 admissions for 2017

This year is the first year in which we have had a class in year 6 (Class 5), the year in which, in the primary/secondary system, parents need to apply for a place at secondary school for the following year. We will be adding a whole new class to the current year group next September, to go through to Upper School alongside Jenny Wragg's class. If your child is already in Jenny's class, there is nothing you need to do - the pupils will carry on right through to year 11.

If you have a child who is currently in year 6 in another school, and you would like them to come here in year 7, you need to apply now to the Devon County Council Co-ordinated Admissions Scheme

at https://new.devon.gov.uk/educationandfamilies/school-information/apply-for-a-school-place. The first round of admissions closes at midnight on 31st October.

If your child is on the waiting list for our current year 6/class 5, you should also apply for a place in year 7

2017 via the DCC Co-ordinated Scheme. If a place comes up for your child before the next academic year, they would simply join the existing class during this academic year.

Year 7 open evenings We are holding two major open evenings for prospective parents of year 7 in 2017. These evenings will be an opportunity to experience some subject lessons, to meet teaching staff and to discuss any admissions questions. The evenings are Wednesday 21st September and Tuesday 11th October from 7pm. 


